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ExecutiveSummary

This year Annual report is based on our "Performance during Pandemic 2020." As we all know that COVID-19 was declared as an outbreak by World Health Organization (WHO) since December2019. The virus reached Pakistan on 26 February 2020, when two cases were recorded. On 18 March 2020, cases had been registered in all four provinces, the two autonomous territories, and Islamabad Capital Territory, by 17 June each district in Pakistan had recorded its cases of COVID-19.

We are proud to share that Rahnuma-FPAP is a leading member of Pakistan's civil society playing its vital role from day one in the combat zone to provide necessary support to contain the spread of COVID-19. Despite lockdown we have extended FP&RH services across Pakistan. We being a member association of International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF) in Pakistan following all WHO and GoP guidelines to protect our patients and service providers.

Under the supervision of CEO, Rahnuma-FPAP following IPPF footsteps formed core committee on COVID-19 to look into all matters related to COVID-19 whether safety items, staff and programs matters etc, every matters were dealt under emergency protocols of Rahnuma-FPAP. Our staff has been provided with PPEs and other staff protection tools. We provided all requisite equipment's and necessary logistics to all services delivery points as our services delivery apparatus is composed of nine fully equipped Family Health Hospitals, more than one hundred Family Health Centers and thousands of Community Based Distributors and Private Practitioners reaching millions of people annually.

Our non-clinical staff have been working from their homes on roster basis. Whereas our community engagement services and outreach activities have been hit, which includes mobilization, training, counselling, community outreach sessions and youth engagement channels. However, we have provided counselling through our six dedicated helplines and IEC material in regards to COVID-19 protocols and guidelines.

The Health Care Workers were considered for the various tasks related to maternal health and comprehensive post abortion care, including awareness raising, counselling, birth preparedness, lactation management etc. other related to pregnancy, delivery and/or postpartum care. Multiple





approaches were adapted to ensure and reach the poor, marginalized and underserved communities including door to door visits.

Rahnuma-FPAP signed MoUs with National and Provincial governments, developing partners and CSOs including NDMA, PWD, UNFPA, DoH, Pakistan Rangers and Ministry of Environment. These MoUs focused on the health, RH & FP, disaster resilience. COVID-19 related concerns and environment. These MoUs were also aim to improve access and availability of Implants through service providers including paramedics at public sector facilities and to address choice of method available, overcome missed opportunities and improve contraceptive method mix.

Rahnuma-FPAP implemented Humanitarian Capacity Development Center (HCDC) as a lead along with other IPPF member associations (Yemen, Sudan, Burundi, Burkina Faso and Central African Republic. The project's main objective is to improve the capacity and capability of MAs in countries with high risk to natural disasters or spikes in conflicts or epidemics, so that they can respond rapidly & effectively and scale up the delivery of life-saving and essential RH & FP services. Due to COVID-19 inception meetings were conducted virtually through zoom link.

The biggest success during this phase of Global Comprehensive Health Care Initiative (GCHCI) project was to maintain and adapt service delivery to ensure access to FP&RH services for clients. GCHCI Services Delivery Points (SDPs) remained functional all over Pakistan, adopting strict protection and safety measures for service providers and clients. They were also provided FP&RH counselling through six dedicated toll free helplines. During the year 2020 a

total 565,825 clients visited the GCHCI SDPs, in which 470,464 were RH & FP clients.

IPPF accreditation is carried out for all of its full members associations globally after every 5 years. Accreditation system aims to ensure that all the Federation's Member Associations meet and comply with IPPF standards. Rahnuma-FPAP has already been accredited twice by IPPF and currently the process of phase-III of the IPPF accreditation was conducted online as well as by a third party engaged by IPPF.

Rahnuma-FPAP has so far utilized over 200,000 units of DMPA SC through FPAP outlets with a generous support received from UNFPA. The first ever National level operational study on utilization of Sayana Press under private sector was also conducted by Rahnuma-FPAP during 2020 and its findings were shared with all stakeholders.

FP2030 Pakistan Country Engagement Working Group (CEWG), established by Government of Pakistan, Ministry of National Health Service, Regulation and Coordination (MNHSRC) formed an Advocacy and Media Sub-group to further streamline the SBCC Strategy in line with recently formulated CCI Recommendations. The Advocacy and Media Sub-group of CEWG further constituted the Advocacy & Media SBCC Strategy Formulation Sub-group. The SBCC Media Strategy Formulation Sub-group is chaired by PWD-Punjab with Rahnuma-FPAP as a Co-Chairperson.

The Data and Program Review Group held meetings, where Rahnuma-FPAP is a member, software to capture data and expedite analysis has been processed. The contraceptive commodity security group with FPAP as member has lead to contraceptive security.

Despite of COVID-19 pandemic Rahnuma-FPAP was able to achieve 1.65 million CYPs in 2020 under its operations across Pakistan. It is pertinent to mentioned here that more than 17.7 million FP&RH services were provided, out of which 7.5 Million services were exclusively targeted to young people. Moreover Rahnuma-FPAP provided 0.80 Million HIV related services and remained a leading CSO contributor of FP&RH services in Pakistan. More than 62.6% clients were poor & vulnerable and 86% services were exclusively targeted for women.

COVID-19 Pandemic Rahnuma-FPAP

Awareness Campaigns

Chief Executive Officer's interview on the impact of COVID-19 by IPPF. Some recaps of the interview.

How badly has Pakistan been affected by the Coronavirus?

The COVID-19 pandemic has wreaked havoc on overall economies worldwide and so has affected Pakistan's already trembling economy; the virus has led to a global economic shutdown and upended life.

What impact is it having when it comes to sexual and reproductive health & rights (SRHR)?

The provinces under COVID-19 list, FP/SRH services have not been fully addressed in the essential service lists, moreover doctors and paramedics are placed at the disposal of the Health Department for use under COVID-19 response. Shortage/non availability of contraceptives and antibiotics to treat STIs due to disruptions in supply chains are another serious issues.

Is frontline staff still able to go into the community? If yes what challenges they are facing?

We are happy that our staff from day one is working with the Government and other organizations to raise awareness about complying with the rules on Coronavirus prevention. Our LHVs are providing services at door steps nationwide information. Banners have been developed and displayed at points where community can see them; leaflets have also been developed and distributed to clients.

What are you doing to keep providing services to people in all the regions in Pakistan?

Despite lockdown our SRHR and FP services delivery network across the Pakistan remained functional with initial staff, we also provided counseling and urgent consultation through our helpline, all staff has been provided with PPEs and other staff protection tools. Our headquarter and regional staff are working from their homes on roaster basis to ensure continuity of contraceptives.

COVID-19 SOPs for SDPs:

Rahnuma-FPAP devised the strategy to cope and share the government burden by ensuring continues services through their SDPs while taking effective preventive measures for staff and communities.

SDP's Staff Safety: Avoiding meeting of more than 3 staff, discontinuation of activities like provider trainings, community gatherings and larger meetings at offices.


Providing information to providers as per WHO, NDMA and NCOC guidelines: Providers were immediately contacted through respective PMOs and informed about the evolving situation.

Keeping Community Connected with the Network: Rahnuma-FPAP staff remain connected with their referral partners, community awareness was carried out by displaying posters and leaflets in local languages at prominent places. Supportive supervision and refreshers using technology: Refresher training through video links were conducted for services providers to keep them update about COVID-19 prevention and precautions.

Brief list of Procurement of Protective item and its delivery at locations for immediate measures:
Corana testing kits, Clenil Aerosol Nebulising Sol 800mg, Zetro Cap, Softin Tab, Handsanitzer, Dettol Solution, Pump of Spray, Disposable Gloves, Protective Gloves, Infrared thermometer Gun were provided across operations (HO, Punjab, Sindh, Federal, KP and Balouchistan).

Development of Dissemination of COVID-19 SBCC material: Developed and disseminated posters, leaflets, pamphlets and standees in local languages for their display at all the prominent places at SDPs.







Rahnuma-FPAP Role of Action in Pandemic:

Rahnuma Family Planning Association of Pakistan a Member Association of International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF) is one of the largest and oldest civil society organization established much before the constitution of IPPF, back in 1953 exclusively devoted to working in Reproductive Health (RH) and Family Planning (FP). IPPF was constituted by eight of these associations (including FPAP) to mobilize resources for these associations for the very cause of FP (initially for FP and over time covered the entire RH sector). Over time IPPF grew big, currently it covers 150+ countries across the globe with its head office at London and covering the globe through six Regional Structures and Rahnuma-FPAP is part of the South Asia Region.

Rahnuma-FPAP is recognized both nationally and internationally as a leading advocate and service provider for RH & FP. It has distinction to collaborate with all major national and international development agencies (INGOs, UN Systems, public sector, government institutions).

FP and RH Community Outreach Services during the COVID-19:

Rahnuma-FPAP adopted all national & international protocols and guidelines for the FP&RH community outreach services during the COVID-19 pandemic ensuring that FP&RH services in the community should be more targeted towards poor. Community Health Care Workers were provided guidance of referring COVID-19 patient to nearby facility as needed while undertaking all necessary personal protective precautions. The Antenatal registration was continued during home visits and family planning services were provided in an uninterrupted manner. Furthermore postpartum care was provided at household level to identify newborns/children for starting/continuing routine immunization and home visits. It was also decided to deliver key messages on FP&RH during the community visits to all the pregnant women and ensure hand washing and social distancing in one to one meeting. Advocate for home quarantine and self-isolation for healthy people with high-risk contacts. The Health Care Workers were considered for the various tasks related to maternal health and post abortion care, including awareness raising, counselling, birth preparedness, lactation management, issues related to pregnancy, delivery or postpartum care.





Rahnuma FPAP CEO, Syed Kamal Shah and Chairman NDMA Lt. Gen Muhammad Afzal are signing an MOU in presence of Director General IPPF Dr. Alvaro Bermejo and FPAP Team. This is only of his kind, where NDMA signed an MOU with an NGO on strengthening community participation for disaster resilience.





Rahnuma-FPAP and Jhpiego Pakistan signed MoU and through this MoU Jhpiego will handover 9,000 units of DMPA-SC (expiry date of April, 2021) to FPAP for its timely utilization and that in exchange FPAP will return 9,000 unit of DMPA-SC to Jhpiego on receipt of the same from IPPF/UNFPA.

Partnerships (MoUs) Signed:

Rahnuma-FPAP signed MoU with PWD) under its UNFPA funded Project:

Rahnuma-FPAP signed MoUs with PWD-Sindh, KP, Punjab, Balochistan, GB and AJK under its UNFPA funded Project to promote the Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives. The main objectives of this MoU was to increase the access of Long-Acting Family Planning Methods through task shifting and task sharing and support capacity building of service providers of PWD & DoH for providing long term family planning methods. It was further aimed to support Provincial Government's task shifting and task sharing strategies under CIP FP 2020 for expanding long-term family planning services.

As per the MoU Rahnuma-FPAP provided dedicated capacity building and ToTs to the selected PWDs services providers, including orientation sessions at provincial levels, monthly District Technical Committee (DTC) meetings and trainings on implant insertion and removal. Rahnuma-FPAP further trained public sector health care providers through eight specific trainings on LARC and conducted bi-annual

Review Meetings with Project Task force on Task Shifting/Task Sharing. Rahnuma-FPAP aim was to build a strong voice for the LARC at the policy making level and conducted consultative meetings with parliamentarians on family planning advocacy at provincial level.

Training of trainers/refresher trainings in counseling and demand creation and referrals of clients for modern contraceptive methods. The PWDs, also supported Rahnuma-FPAP to develop a supervision mechanism to undertake supervision visits across all facilities ensuring quality and standardized service delivery.

The main objective of this initiative was to 'improve access and availability of implants through service providers including paramedics at public sector facilities. It was also aimed to address choice of methods available, overcome missed opportunities and improve contraceptive method mix. It was transpired that the objectives of the project can only be reached through a well-coordinated effort in which all the partners/stakeholders ioin hands.

Department of Health (DoH) KP Region

Rahnuma-FPAP signed MoU with Pakistan Rangers to provide FP&RH services at Phuklian Bajwat, Sialkot:

Rahnuma-FPAP signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Pakistan Rangers to provide FP&RH services. The MoU is aimed at to overcome missed opportunities and improve contraceptive method mix. It was transpired that the objectives of this MoU can only be reached through a well-coordinated effort in which all the partners/stakeholders join hands together. The MoU further expand the FP&RH outreach services through Rahnuma-FPAP infrastructure in areas managed by Pakistan Rangers at Phuklian Bajwat, Sialkot.

Rahnuma-FPAP signed MoU with Environment Protection Department Punjab (EPD):

Rahnuma Family Planning Association of Pakistan, signed MoU with Environment Protection Department Punjab. The MoU was signed by Minister for Environment Protection Department Punjab and CEO, Rahnuma-FPAP. The main objective of this MoU is to ensure sustainable and equitable use of resources without degrading the environment or risking health/safety. It was further aimed to raise awareness and understanding of the link between environment and development and Usage of Eco-friendly resources.













World Population Day 2020:

Rahnuma-FPAP organized poster competition in partnership with PWD Puniab & UNFPA on World Population Day 2020 under the theme "Putting the brakes on COVID-19: How to Safeguard the Health and Rights of Women and Girls Now". Under this poster competition received plenty of creative and innovative posters in view of World Population Day theme and it was really tough and time taking exercise to figure out the first, second and third position amongst plenty of masterpieces from participants taking part in the poster competition from all over Pakistan. Later, award distribution ceremony was held to award certificates to all participants and cash prizes to position holders at Rahnuma Training Institute (RTI). Secretary Population Welfare Department Punjab was guest of hounor and distributed shields among the successful winners of the competition. Secretary Population Welfare Department Punjab in his concluding remarks highlighted the high population growth rate, a main reason for poverty and malnutrition. He further shared that Population Welfare Department is working hard to increase contraceptive prevalence rate (CPR), in line with international commitments.

Rahnuma-FPAP celebrated world population day all across its system of operation throughout Pakistan.

Medical Camps:

Rahnuma-FPAP has been working as a frontline soldier for humanitarian services. In this regard, Rahnuma-FPAP organized medical camps in the flood-affected areas in Muzaffargarh under WISH2ACTION project. The medical camps provided free medicines and family planning services to the target population. We also organized outreach service delivery camp in collaboration with BHU Doaba in the floodaffected area Basti Dhund, Doaba. DCMC members Respected Dr. Muhammad Kazim DoH HR (DHA) and Dr. Igbal Makwal DoH PS (DHA) and Malik Khair Muhammad Budh visited the camp. The members of Community Flood Response Team also contributed in tenting and other local arrangements.









LSBE Taskforce:

Life Skill Based Education (LSBE) is an important part of Rahnuma-FPAP's strategic plan and is being integrated with different initiatives. LSBE is being imparted at two levels, first is to generate public discourse for the acceptability of LSBE in youth policies and second is to advocate for prioritizing LSBE issue at policy level. Rahnuma-FPAP has joined hands with the like-minded organizations to formulate a national level coalition/taskforce to raise a strong collective voice in favor of LSBE. Rahnuma-FPAP is working with UNFPA, and other partners. This Taskforce has worked in close collaboration to develop a framework to outline what will constitute Life Skill Based Education in context of Pakistan, A number of well researched and informative IEC tools were developed and disseminated to divulge comprehensive LSBE information and education to young people, parents and community leaders through peer education and sensitization sessions. Different lobbying meetings were held with line departments, including education departments, curriculum wing, policy makers and provincial education departments. These meetings successfully develop advocates in parliament, government departments, youth and media to advocate for LSBE at the policy level.

National Youth Network (NYN):

Rahnuma-FPAP under its overall youth and adolescent capacity development program transpired to form Rahnuma-FPAP National Youth Network (RNYN). Rahnuma-FPAP National Youth Network (RNYN) shares the same core values of Rahnuma-FPAP and IPPF. RNYN is committed to implement the Government International commitments regarding young people and is mandated to initiate Youth programs which empower young people in Pakistan by building their capacities and skills to access reproductive health services.

The core functional areas of RNYN are to advocate for Life Skills Based Education in Pakistan with parliamentarian, policy makers, media, and civil society. It is also mandated to work against child marriage through social media Campaign, awareness raising, and lobbying for legislative change.



COVID-19 ImpactonFP&RH



Pakistan along with other developing countries of South Asia, East Asia and Africa were affected by the pandemic. IPPF Director-General Pr. Alvaro Bermejo has termed the COVID-19 pandemic as a health crisis across every setting, and that includes family Planning and reproductive healthcare

COVID-19 Impact on FP&RH:

COVID-19 pandemic is having a major impact on the delivery of reproductive healthcare around the world as per IPPF across Member Association survey conducted during 2020. The survey shared that, 633 static and mobile clinics and community-based care outlets have been closed because of the outbreak. across 64 countries. They make up 14% of the total service delivery points IPPF members ran in 2018. Pakistan along with other developing countries of South Asia, East Asia and Africa were affected by the pandemic. IPPF Director-General Dr. Alvaro Bermejo has termed the COVID-19 pandemic as a health crisis across every setting, and that includes family planning and reproductive healthcare.

Rahnuma-FPAP has been amongst member associations of IPPF that did not close down it's clinics and continuously provided FP&RH services using innovative approaches, throughout Pakistan (while other partner organizations have to close their SDPs for some time).





Women Integrated Sexual Health (WISH2ACTION)

Rahnuma-FPAP "In partnership with IPPF, Women's Integrated Sexual Health (WISH) is a flagship family planning (FP) program to deliver 20% of the UKs FP global commitments for FP2020. WISH2ACTION aims to enable women to safely plan their pregnancies and improve reproductive health. The Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), earlier called DFID, funded WISH2ACTION program aims to ensure access to reproductive health, particularly family planning for all, especially the poorest women and girls and to make sustainable improvements in their reproductive health.

Rahunma-FPAP, Humanity & Inclusion (HI) and Options are the WISH consortium partners in Pakistan are working with country level collaborating partners including the Departments of Health, Population Welfare Departments, and Integrated Reproductive, Maternal, New Born and Child Health and Nutrition (IRMNCH&N) Program of the Primary and Secondary Healthcare Department (PSHD) Punjab, to deliver WISH outputs. The project is implemented in 10 districts of Pakistan including AJK through cluster model.

The outcome for the program is 3.8 million CYPs generated by expanded access to FP services; 317,000 additional users of family planning among which 5% of the FP services to be provided to the young people under the age bracket <20 years and targeting the poorest."









Training on Counselling, FP Methods, Cervical Cancer Screening through VIA, SGBV Screening and Quality of Care under WISH project

WISH2ACTION COVID-19 Adaption:

As Government and NDMA has declared National Health Emergency across the country and provincial governments have moved toward partial and complete lock down therefore FPAP device the strategy to cope, while keeping in view the professional commitments & obligations, sharing government burden and ensure the non-stop services delivery at all the clusters while adapting the effective preventive measures for staff and communities.

Package of Integrated Services:

RH and FP services delivery continued at SDPs level with increased Infection Prevention, hygiene practices and close government coordination. Besides, strategy of visiting door to door for the provision of short acting FP methods, counselling, SGBV counselling and manageable treatment, referral for specialized consultation and other RH consultation proved as a key element of success.

Community Outreach:

Later we covered outreach by adapting COVID-19 preventive measures and Government SOPs. Multiple approaches were adapted to ensure and reach maximum people and communities. We conducted door to door visits, individual counselling, small group sessions, social distancing and social media networks etc used for dissemination of COVID-19 messages, IEC/SBCC material (Supported by other donor project) and community engagement activities. Furthermore OSD camps were organized and conducted with increased infection prevention and hygiene practices to ensure access to the underserved communities. The Community outreach was adapted by COVID-19 preventive measures and Government SOPs. Multiple approaches were adapted to ensure and reach the poor, marginalized and underserved communities. Shared COVID-19 IEC material to the government offices at district levels, strengthened the referral system with government for COVID-19 suspected clients (Testing & Treatment) through public sector support. Capacity building of Public Service providers was done at 10 clusters (163 service providers) on COVID-19 preventive measure & messages. Along with this distribution of short acting methods and use of PPEs/emergency medical equipment were supplied to the community. Other than this 10 virtual Trainings of FPAP service providers were conducted and attended by 158 FPAP service providers (51 Male and 107 Female). Enhanced Risk of SGBV during crises, and provide support and training to enable supportive counselling and specialist referral was also provided.





Improving Access to Long Acting Reversible Methods through Task Sharing/Shifting:

This project continual in collaboration with UNFPA from last many years to strengthen provincial capacities to manage the delivery and accessibility of FP&RH. The main goal of this project was to provide training on FP counseling, infection prevention, and hormonal methods of FP to health service providers. We also worked with the provinces to develop strategies on FP Task Shifting (Implants), and to improve the delivery and uptake of RH and FP services. Another objective of the project was to develop task sharing and task shifting strategies for Govt. adoption.

Under this TS/TS project we developed IEC material and case studies to better showcase our work this include 72000 pamphlets and 6000 posters which were printed in local languages and shared with Tharparkar and Killa Abdullah team for dissemination. Case studies/documentary were being developed. Billboards on FP (with rights based approach and inclusion of disability) were posted at different locations/districts by PWD in GB. These included Nager, Khaplu-Kharmung, Gilgit, Astor, Diamar, Nagar, Hunza and Skardu. A ToT was conducted for young advocates on 'Youth and Adolescents SRH&R" arranged at Rahnuma Training Institute (RTI), Lahore. The training was attended by 23 youth members including 12 young girls and 11 boys from four Districts of Lahore, Muzaffargarh, Chakwal and Faisalabad. 4 trickle down trainings were organized at District level with

16 TGs, 40 Young girls and 15 young boys. A total of 102 community awareness sessions were organized during project life, through these sessions 2865 young girls and boys were sensitized on their SRH&R needs and Rights. (Rahnuma-FPAP followed strict SOPs during all these trainings).

As part of initiative to promote interactive dialogues between youth and policy makers on FP&RH of youth and adolescents issues in Pakistan, a workshop was organized and a youth-led community mobilization platform was formed, oriented and engaged in RH/gender awareness raising and sensitization. This Workshop was attended by 30 representatives from youth led organizations, young advocates and CBOs run by young people.

A Technical Committee was notified by the Secretary PWD/GB and its members were oriented/sensitized on CCI recommendations/FP 2020. The Committee main roles were to work as a secretariat to support the Task Force meetings on population issues and to provide technical support in development of 5 years PC 1 for PWD.





Rahnuma-FPAP under its Reproductive Health Program in Crisis and post crisis situations (Sprint I,II and III) organized capacity building session to improve the delivery and uptake of RH and FP services

Reproductive Health Program in Crisis and Post Crisis Situations (Sprint I, II and III)

The SPRINT Initiative (Reproductive Health Program in crisis and post-crisis situations) was designed to address gaps in the implementation of the Minimum Initial Service Package (MISP) for Reproductive Health, a set of priority activities to be implemented at the onset of an emergency. The main objectives of this initiative was to develop relationships & coordination with Government stakeholders, and ensure that the health sector/cluster lead the implementation of the MISP and prevent and manage the consequences of sexual violence. It further aims to develop a mechanism to reduce STIs, including HIV transmission of maternal women, and prevent excess maternal and neonatal mortality and morbidity in selected areas. SPRINT Initiative is funded by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) under the Australian Government and managed by International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF). The initiative ensures access to essential lifesaving RH services for women, men and children in times of crises, when services are most needed yet are not prioritized by key humanitarian responders. Through MISP, practical solutions were formulated, and humanitarian workers were trained to deal with issues relating to pregnancy, childbirth, reproductive

health and the aftermath of rape and violence. Saving lives is the core aspect of the SPRINT Initiative.

Under this project coordination's meetings were conducted with PDMA in four provinces Punjab, KP, Baluchistan and Sindh. Liaison meeting were conducted with District Disaster Management Authority in four provinces (Muzffarghar in Punjab, Badin in Sindh, Peshawar in KP and Quetta in Baluchistan). The main purpose of the meeting was follow up on inclusion of MISP in their agenda during the emergency situations. Rahnuma-FPAP organized a two days training of 21 young people and disable persons on "MISP" The objective of this training was to enhance the capacity and establish a pool of youth resources at national levels with awareness. knowledge and understanding of the MISP.





Humanitarian Capacity Development Centre (HCDC) Project:

Rahnuma-FPAP implemented a Humanitarian Capacity Development Project (HCDC) as capacity building lead along with other IPPF Member Associations (Yemen, Sudan, Burundi, Burkina Faso and Central African Republic under the first phase. The main aim of the project is to set up and implement IPPF's Humanitarian Capacity Development Centre to build relevant expertise and capacity among MAs and Collaborative partners in at least 10 high-risk countries. The overall objective of the project is to improve the capacity of the priority MAs to ensure that agile and responsive systems are put in place to enable rapid (within 72 hours of disaster event/upsurge) lifesaving humanitarian response. It's further aim is to strengthen the capacity and capability of MAs in countries with high risk to 'natural' disasters or spikes in conflict or epidemics (acute crisis) and/or are experiencing significant levels of protracted/complex crisis, so that they can respond rapidly (within 72 hours) effectively scale up the delivery of life-saving and essential SRH services and transition to comprehensive as the situation allows.

The project has to undertake Inception meeting with priority Member Associations (Mas), Visioning Workshop, Establish a surge roster at national level, Humanitarian capacity assessment and developing capacity development plans to undertake MISP trainings and provision of lifesaving MISP services, conducting operational research study and

develop mainstreaming and service delivery curriculum in crisis situation.

It is an 18 months project (August 2020 to January 2022) and Rahnuma-FPAP is implementing the project as Lead partner while Reproductive Health Uganda (RHU) is Co-Lead. There will be 10 priority MAs, which will implement HCDC activities in their countries during project life. Due to COVID-19 situation, inception meetings were conducted virtually through Zoom Link with MA Yemen on 20th August attended by 09 participants (03 from FPAP, 01 from RHU, 02 from Humanitarian Hub and 03 from MA Yemen), 17th December with MA Burkina Faso attended by 08 participants (03 from FPAP, 02 from RHU and 03 from MA Burkina Faso), 22nd December with MA Burundi attended by 06 participants (02 from FPAP, 02 from RHU and 02 from MA Burundi) and 23rd December with MA Sudan attended by 06 participants (02 from FPAP and 04 from MA Sudan). During 2020 Work Planning/Budgeting by MAs (MA Yemen finalized and others in process) and four meetings were conducted of Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) dated 15 Oct, 13 Nov 08th Dec, 10th Dec 2020 which were attended on average by 07-10 representatives of FPAP, RHU, SARO, Humanitarian Hub and ARO.



Global Comprehensive Health Care Initiative (GCHCI) Phase-V:

In the year 2020, COVID-19 Pandemic has affected the normal functioning of the community. The service areas that showed the biggest decrease in 2020 as compared to 2019 across country were maternal and child health, such as antenatal care, RH services, facility deliveries, postnatal care and FP services which decreased in the first half of 2020 in comparison to 2019, however, delivery of these services began to recover in the second half of the year, which now again is affected with the current third wave of COVID.

The major success of GCHCI was to maintain and adapt service delivery to ensure access to SRH services for clients. GCHCI SDPs remained functional all over the Pakistan. adopting strict protection and safety measures for service providers and clients. They are also providing RH counselling through six dedicated toll free helplines. During the year 2020 a total 565,825 clients visited the GCHCI SDPs, in which RH (including FP) clients were 470,464. In addition, community door to door visits by LHV were increased for the provision of counseling, FP&RH services. Moreover, clients were also oriented on self-injection of DMPA-SC/Sayana Press, self-testing for pregnancy and blood sugar with rapid kits.



Rahnuma-FPAP organized in a Seminar to Empower Youth under Get Up Speak Out (GUSO) Project at Quetta Balochistan

Get Up Speak Out Project (GUSO):

The Pakistan GUSO Country partnership comprised of Family Planning Association of Pakistan, Idara-e-Taleem-o-Agahi (ITA) and Blessings Welfare Association (BWA). In 2018 Rahnuma-FPAP started to work on GUSO as host Organization with Idara-e-Taleem-o-Agahi (ITA), and Blessings Welfare Association (BWA).

During 2020 under GUSO project, Rahnuma-FPAP adapted the safeguarded existing strategies through online peer educator training sessions and trained young people as peer educators and peer providers keeping in mind COVID-19 situation. These trained Peer Educators and Peer Providers conducted online trainings & sessions on Life Skills Based Education during July & August, 2020. They also conducted online sessions with youth on the importance of COVID-19 prevention keeping in mind SoPs designed by the government to counter and limit the spread of pandemic in the communities. These Peer Educators and Peer Providers worked as agents of change, disseminating information on COVID-19 during critical situation, 108 young people & teachers were trained as a Peer Educators including 4 transgender persons. These trained peer educators conducted sessions with 18,676 in schools and out of schools young people and provided the information on Life Skills Based Education and Reproductive Health Issues of young people.

During the year 2020, 18 Schools were identified in Lahore, Quetta and Karachi and MoUs were signed with School management for smooth implementation of project activities at school level by involving teachers, management and students to impart LSBE. In-school activities could not be conducted due to pandemic situation as schools remained closed while community related activities were conducted in

the last few months of the year. Trained teachers conducted sessions with 3.676 in schools students in the last quarter when the lock down situation got normal and schools were re-opened. Service providers were also trained on how to talk about different RH issues of young people. 41,073 direct services were provided to young people. 2850 young girls and women were also engaged during the community sensitization sessions. Moreover, information on RH issues were also provided through toll free Helpline and face to face counselling services. Helpline counselors were capacitated on Youth friendly health services. These sessions were conducted through inclusive approach and young people and parents from diverse background took part in these sessions, 30 skill development trainings were organized with 1068 girls and boys. The purpose of these trainings was to assist them to become self-reliant by sharpening their current skills and developing new ones, as well as by increasing their selfconfidence.

Rahnuma-FPAP launched a social media campaign during the month of October, 2020 under Get Up Speak Out project through Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, Radio, Celebrities/Influencers endorsements for key youth empowerment related messages. A total number of 1,951,504 individuals were reached through radio and social media campaign. GUSO social media campaign remained top trend in Pakistan for five consecutive hours on 22nd October, 2020.

Poverty Alleviation Program (PAP):

Rahnuma-FPAP is empowering women and addressing existing gender economic and social inequalities through Poverty Alleviation Program (PAP). The project was started in 2002 in collaboration with Khushhali Microfinance Bank Limited (KMBL) as part of private public sector partnership. Over years, project has benefitted 316,686 women, men and youth across Pakistan. The main activities include loans disbursement, awareness raising sessions on FP&RH, provision of counseling & referral services, capacity building of borrowers on basic literacy & numeracy, and capacity building of staff on program policies/procedures and RH.

Objectives:

- I. The primary objective of the program is to "enhance social capital through community mobilization and strengthening solidarity, skills and social awareness of the poor by enabling their participation in and access to financial services" for poverty alleviation.
- II. Empowering women and youth to express their views in decisions directly affecting their lives, and Enhancing their access to reproductive health and family planning services.

Outcomes/Results 2020:

 4,720 community members with 2944 groups formed and provided awareness on Microfinance.

During the first quarter of 2020 PAP team achieved 81% targets. However, in March 2020 due to COVID-19, national level lockdown was imposed by the Government of Pakistan. KMBL management decided to halt new client's sale from March-August, 2020. Carrying out the planned activities during the period was a major challenge. Later, in the month of August, the government started to implement smart lockdowns' where specific areas were sealed due to high number of COVID-19 patients.

In response to these challenges the team had to restrategize the program and to mitigate losses by phasing out low performance locations and managing HR & operational costs. Eventually, in Q3 & Q4 when the intensity of the COVID-19 decreased and the lockdown was reverted activities were performed according to the targets in smooth way.

Khyber Pakhtunlkhawa Reproductive Health Bill 2020:

The Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhawa on July 27th 2020 passed the Reproductive Healthcare Rights Act 2020 with an objective to promote and strengthen the reproductive healthcare rights of all segments of society including vulnerable and poorest section of the society. The RH bill has been passed in line with CCI Recommendations and FP 2020 international commitments. The salient features of the bill are to provide reproductive healthcare information, which provides awareness regarding the mental, physical health and wellbeing of individual and families and allows services users to make all decisions on the basis of full free and informed consent. It also stipulates to raise public awareness on the prevalence and impact morbidity and mortality and availability of medical science to prevent them from suffering. The bill also seeks to ensure through the PWD workers that parents have a right to freely and responsibly decide the number, spacing and timing of their children and no person will be discriminated against their reproductive lives, in their access to services and information on the grounds of race, colour, sex, creed or any other criteria of discrimination. The bill also seeks to ensure all women have a right to be protected from discrimination in social, domestic or employment spheres by reasons of pregnancies or motherhood.

BILL

to provide reproductive healthcare and promote reproductive health rights in the Province of the Kimber Pakhumkhun

WHEREAS it is expedient to recognize and promote reproductive health entitles and provide reproductive healthcare in accordance with the Constitution of Idamin Republic of Pakistan and International Commitments made by the Government of Pakistan.

It is hereby enacted as follows

 Short title, extent and commencement.--(1) This Act may be called the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Reproductive Healthcare Rights Act, 2020.

(2) It shall extend to the whole of the Province of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

(3) It shall come into force at once.

 Definitions, —In this Act, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context, the following expressions shall have the meaning hereby assigned to it, that is to 20/y.

- "Department" mesos the Population Welface Department of Government:
- "designated product" means a product used in provision of family planning and reproductive health services;
 - "Government" means the Government of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa;
- (d) "reproductive health" means a state of complete physical, mental and social wellbeing, and not merely the absence of disease and infirmity, in all matters relating to the reproductive system, its functions and processes;
- (e) "reproductive health care facility" means the facility providing reproductive health and family planning services such as family welfare centers, reproductive beath service contres, miles service units and any other service outlets introduced by Population. Welfare Department, reproductive health service outlets of private sector and NOS including framehists certifies.
- (f) "reproductive health care providees" mean public and private institutions and an individual certified from the recognized institute which offer reproductive health care services;
- (g) "reproductive rights" mean the right of couples to reach the highest level of reproductive health without discrimination, contrion and violence;
- (b) "choice" means a voluntary choice or decision, based on the knowledge of all available information relevant to the choice or decision and know how to use the chosen method strily and effectively, as well as uncertainting possible side-effectar.
- (i) "prescribed" means prescribed by rules;
- (i) "Province" means the Province of the Khyter Pakhturkhwa; and
- (k) "rules" mean the rules made under this Act
- Powers and functions of the Department .-- Department shall-
 - (a) provide reproductive healthcase information, which provides evacuous regarding the month and physical health and wellbeing of individuals and families and allows corrice users to make all discissions on the basis of full tree and informed countrie;
 - (b) calse public awareness on the providence and respect of murbicity and montality and availability of medical science to present this sufficing.
 - (c) ensure through its workers that pasents have a right to ment; and responsibly decide the number, specing and thining of their children;

Inauguration of Family Health Clinic (FHC) NAROWAL:

Rahnuma-FPAP reconstructed Family Health Clinic in Narowal was inaugurated by Dr. Rashida Panezai, President Rahnuma-FPAP. The new facility would be instrumental in proving RH services to marginalized and vulnerable segments of society. It is pertinent here that Rahnuma-FPAP RH & FP based services delivery apparatus is composed of 09 fully equipped Family Health Hospitals, more than one hundred Family Health Centres. During 2020 we provided more than 17 million SRH&R services while covering more than six million clients. More over our SDPs provide pre and post abortion services, HIV & AIDS, STI/RTI, Gynecology, Obstetrics, Urology, Sub-fertility, Specialized SRH, SRH-Pediatrics, Other SRH and Contraceptive Services. A Big Leap Towards System Strengthening Launch of Advanced Level Data Management Software:

Rahnuma Family Planning of Pakistan (R-FPAP) launched its Data Management Software (DMS) on 14th January 2021, with a click by the CEO. The launching ceremony held at head office Lahore, which was virtually attended by staff members across Pakistan.

The basic architecture of DMS on PHP and MySQL platform makes data management more dynamic, fast, smooth and reliable which can be operated through latest internet browsers including Chrome, Firefox and Microsoft Edge.

As compared to previously used data management software in Rahnuma-FPAP; which was being used for the processing of services statistics only, new advance level DMS has included number of vertical modules for capturing data of other work areas of Rahnuma-FPAP such as trainings, meetings, advocacy events, helpline, life skills based education sessions, chart of accounts, inventory management, human resources etc.

The DMS has been designed to generate reports against multiple genres and periodicity e.g. monthly, quarterly, half

yearly and yearly reports with reference to its appropriately relevant tier of execution i.e. service delivery points, program management offices, regional offices and head office. Extensive pre-testing, pilot runs and double data entry by DMS potential users of all possible relevant tiers ensured security checks, accuracy and precision in data processing. Service statistics related component has been ensured with double data entry in both old and new software from July to October 2020; reports were compared; and entire service statistics' archive from January 2015 onwards has been imported onto new DMS.











Total Family Planning, Sexual & Reproductive Health (SRH) and Non-SRH Services, 2020



Population Covered, 2020









Couple Year Protection

Opinion


